

Through the cooperation with AOFOG over the years, our shared objectives remain the same:

- 1. To improve the skills of healthcare workers in these countries through simulation training on obstetric emergencies, ultimately contributing to better maternal and neonatal health outcomes.
- 2. To train local trainers to organise Obstetric Emergencies courses.

Our methodology is twofold:

- 1. Providing curriculum for free to local Obstetric trainers to equip them to organise courses.
- 2. Providing onsite support by Malaysian trainers and equipment.


Simulation Workstations were organised on common Obstetrics Emergencies like Maternal collapse, Postpartum haemorrhage, Eclampsia, Labour room skills of Instrumental and Breech, MRP and Uterine Inversion, Genital Tract Traumas. Difficult Caesarean stations were also simulated.

Key Results

Trained Professionals: 75 O&G doctors were trained across the three countries.


Improved Skills: Participants demonstrated significant improvements in practical skills, such as the ability to manage postpartum haemorrhage and handle complicated deliveries. These were measured by the pre and post course Skills tests.

Pre and Post Course Test Score for Laos, Nepal and Mongolia




We rely heavily on the feedback after the course to evaluate ways to improve the delivery of the course. Most participants find the Hands-On learning with simulation beneficial.

Report of MFM committee attending Stillbirth alliance conference 2024 Colombo, Sri Lanka

19th annual conference of the international stillbirth alliance was held in Colombo Sri Lanka on the 3rd to 6th November in The Hilton hotel with the participation of more than 300 health care providers from all around the world. The theme of the conference was leaving no country behind: Moving beyond awareness to action to save babies. The conference was organized by several organizations namely International Stillbirth Alliance, College of Community Physicians of Sri Lanka, Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists, Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo and UNICEF. International and local experts in different



specialties including Obstetricians, Community physicians, Neonatologist medical administrators attended the meeting. AOFOG on invitation of the organizing committee conducted a session in the conference on the 4th of November. The theme for the session was early pregnancy loss.

The session was chaired by Dr. Rohana Haththotuwa Secretary general of AOFOG and Dr. Vindya Kumarapeli, Director of the Directorate of NCDs in Ministry of Health Sri Lanka. There were three speakers from AOFOG and the first speaker was Dr. U.D.P. Ratnasiri adviser to MFM committee, spoke on the topic of Global best practices of Early Pregnancy Losses and situation and challenges in the region. Dr. Charmila Ayyawoo from India highlighted on Chromosomal anomaly in Recurrent Pregnancy Loss and Dr Karen Lim from National university Singapore spoke on Genetic causes of miscarriage – beyond the chromosome. There was Q& A session at the end. This session was attended by many local and international health care providers including consultants, PG trainees, medical officers, nurses and midwives.

Report of the "Climate Change & Pollution Working Group AOFOG": September - October 2024

Professor Krishnendu Gupta (Deputy Secretary General AOFOG, 2022–2026 and Chair – Climate Change & Pollution Working Group AOFOG, 2022–2026) was the guest faculty at two very important scientific conferences on the topic entitled "Climate Change and Women's Health".



- 1. 20 September 2024: 37th AICC RCOG Annual Conference, Kolkata, West Bengal, India.
- 2. 19 October 2024: 9th ICOG FOGSI Annual Conference 2024, Ahmedabad, Gujarat, India.

At both these conferences, Professor Gupta highlighted the current scenario of the effects of climate change on humans and endocrine disruptive chemicals (EDCs) on human reproduction, with special emphasis on increased global temperatures, extreme weather and disaster, precipitation extremes, rising sea



levels and changes in land use and growing seasons. He highlighted the effects on extreme heat and heat related illnesses, air and water pollution, reduced food and water quality, changes in vector transmission and increasing allergens. The main focus of his presentations was on pregnancy where he presented the latest available global and Indian data on the effects of extreme heat in increasing the incidence of miscarriage, still / premature births and low birthweight by 2 – 3-fold when compared to acceptable / normal temperatures for the respective region. Professor Gupta also emphasized on what OBGYNs can do are what the healthcare personnel and OBGYNs are doing to combat this dreaded new "epidemic"!! He also highlighted the important responsibility and role of international federations like FIGO and AOFOG along with National Societies and NGOs to increase awareness, impart knowledge and education in this very important space. After all, together "WE" can all make a difference. And most importantly we must not forget that "there is no reproductive health if there is no planetary health"!!

Report on the "AOFOG Session" during the 9th ICOG FOGSI Annual Conference 2024 on 19 October 2024 in Ahmedabad, Gujarat, INDIA

An extremely interactive "AOFOG Session on Cervical Cancer" was held during the 9th ICOG FOGSI Annual Conference 2024 held at the beautiful Karnavati Club, Sarkhej - Gandhinagar Highway, Ahmedabad, Gujarat, India on 19 October 2024 between 1510 - 1615 hours.

The Chairs of the session Jaydeep were Dr Tank (President FOGSI, 2024 and Chair YGAA Committee AOFOG. 2022-2026), Alpesh Gandhi (Past President **FOGSI** and **FOGSI** Representative to AOFOG.



2024-2026) and Professor Krishnendu Gupta (Deputy Secretary General AOFOG, 2022-2026 and Chair - Climate Change & Pollution Working Group AOFOG, 2022-2026).

Following the customary and insightful welcome message by Dr John Tait, President AOFOG, the Secretary General of AOFOG, Dr Rohana Haththotuwa, gave a wonderful, interesting and insightful perspective of AOFOG's "Overview of the WHO 90–70–90 Cervical Cancer Elimination Programme". This was followed by two very educative and extremely informative back–to–back presentations by Dr Christia Padolina (Treasurer AOFOG, 2024 – 2026) on "Scoping the HPV Vaccination program in Asia Oceania" and "Evolving HPV Screening Programs in the Asia Pacific Region". Thereafter, Dr Priya Ganeshkumar (Chairperson, FOGSI Oncology Committee, 2021–2024 and Member of the Cervical Cancer Elimination Program AOFOG) gave a detailed and updated overview of the "Treatment and Referral system for Early and Late Cervical Cancer".

The entire session evoked a lot of thought and introspection amongst the delegated present, more so during the very interactive "Open Forum" with kept the faculty busy during the Q&As session, culminating with very knowledgeable "Closing Remarks" by the three learned Chairs of the session.

MFM Committee Report

The newly appointed members of the AOFOG MFM Committee held their inaugural meeting on 1st October 2024, followed by the second meeting on 5th November 2024, both conducted via Zoom. These virtual sessions were pivotal in establishing the framework for the committee's activities over the next two years. During these meetings, the

committee defined its primary goals and mission, identified key educational opportunities, and determined the frequency of future meetings to ensure that all members remain informed and updated on the committee's progress.

The MFM Committee members engaged in a comprehensive discussion of the program, with a particular focus on specific objectives, including: assessing the burden of postpartum hemorrhage (PPH) across the region; tracking maternal anemia as a critical indicator of obstetric outcomes; addressing the rising rates of Caesarean sections and obstetric emergencies; and other issues such as pre-eclampsia. The committee also explored educational opportunities, potential for collaborative research, publication prospects in the Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology Research (JOGR), and other program-related considerations. The meeting was marked by the active participation of all members, each offering valuable insights and perspectives on the effective implementation and monitoring of these initiatives.



REI Committee Report

On the 12th of September 2024, the AOFOG REI committee held the AOFOG Campus 1 webinar with the topic of Ovarian Aging. The webinar was conducted through the Zoom Webinar platform, with 225 participants who joined the event.


The webinar event started with an Introduction by AOFOG by Dr. Rohana Haththotuwa as the General Secretary of AOFOG. The first topic presented was the Concept of Ovarian Aging, by Professor Budi Wiweko from Indonesia. This topic sets a necessary foundation to first understand about the mechanism of ovarian aging, and how it translates to the clinical manifestation of the patient. The second topic was presented by Dr.



Miyuki Harada from Japan, who discussed about the Treatment of ovarian aging. This topic gave

the participants knowledge about the available treatments that can be given in the management of ovarian aging. The third topic was about the Evidence of Ovarian Aging Management, presented by Professor Ben Mol, who summarized the available and updated evidences related to the management of ovarian aging. Throughout the event, active participations were seen from the webinar attendees who asked numerous questions, and this sparked insightful discussion with the speakers and Dr. Nandita Palshetkar as the moderator. The overall impression of the event from the attendees scored excellent score, and an overall score of 93% for all three speakers.

The AOFOG REI committee also held a zoom meeting on the 19th of November 2024 with the members of the REI committee in order to discuss feedbacks from the previous webinar event, possible improvements for future events, and strategies for the upcoming agenda. All of the committee members were present in the zoom meeting.



Through the meeting, three new members of the

AOFOG REI committee were introduced: Masahito Tachibana (Japan), Firoza Begum (Bangladesh), Jennifer KY KO (Hong Kong).

Updates regarding future activities

The next agenda on the REI Committee timeline is the AOFOG Campus 2 with the topic of Endometriosis, in 19 December 2024 through Zoom Webinar. All of the REI committee members have all agreed on the topic and the speakers. The topic that will be discussed in this event are:

- The new pathogenesis of endometriosis: Genetic and epigenetics theory.
- Endometriosis: a disease with few direct treatment.
- A review of the recent evidence and guidelines of endometriosis.
- Best practices of endometriosis treatment in developing countries

Other events that will be done in the future is the AOFOG campus with the topic of PCOS, planned to be held in 24-25 January 2025 through offline meeting. The theme of the event is: "Polycystic Ovary Syndrome: Prevention, Treatment". Diagnosis, and Currently, the event is planned to be held in Yogyakarta, Indonesia. Ultrasound Committee Report

AOFOG-OGSMMA Ultrasound Outreach - 8-9 November 2024

The workshop took place at the Medical Skill, Simulation and Research Center University of Medicine I, Yangon after several months of planning. Thirty senior doctors (postgraduate and post doctorate) from all six medical universities across Myanmar were represented: University of Medicine I, University of Medicine 2, UM Mandalay, UM Magwe, UM Taungyi and UM Defense Medical Service Academy.



The workshop was inaugurated by the Rector of University of Medicine I Prof Kyaw Shwe and President of the Myanmar Medical Association Prof Aye Aung after a recorded message from AOFOG President Professor John Tait was delivered.

Associate Professor Thitima Suntharasaj from Thailand and myself represented AOFOG. Two distinguished local speakers, Prof Nu Nu Aye and Prof Aung Cho Tun, who are radiologists by training, completed the faculty. In recent years, opportunities for doctors to train abroad and interact with overseas expert has been limited, so the event was a welcomed change.

All participants sat for a pretest to assist in aligning their learning objectives. Day 1 began with basic and intermediate core topics in obstetric ultrasound. Day 2 focused on common gynaecological pathologies. Despite having generally good theoretical knowledge, we recognized the lack of exposure in hands-on mentoring and dedicated the bulk of both afternoons for this purpose. We had a myriad of cases arranged for the hands-on session and managed to diagnose several lethal congenital anomalies-allowing planning of subsequent management. There is a need for maternal-fetal medicine services in a country with such a huge population and I have expressed the willingness of AOFOG to assist in future training.





The feedback from the participants showed that the course was on the right track- 86% of respondents felt that they have obtained useful, practice-changing knowledge. The post-test

results also showed significant improvement in the overwhelming majority of participants.

I would like to acknowledge the time and effort taken to obtain regulatory approval by OGSMMA President Prof Khin May Thin and her organizing team- Prof Dr Myat Chit Swe, Prof Dr Cherry, Dr Yamon Oo, Dr July Win, Dr Myat Theingi Kyaw and Dr Chan Myae Win. The efforts of the venue director Dr Aye Mya Aung in ensuring the comfort of participants in commendable.

The support from General Electrics (GE) particularly Grace Park, Amanda, Chuili and the local team ensured that the event ran seamlessly.

SRH Committee Report

1. 39th Scientific Annual Meeting of the The Royal Thai College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (RTCOG 2024)

The Royal Thai College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (RTCOG) has organized an annual scientific meeting on 30 October - 1 November 2024, at the Dusit Thani Hotel in Pattaya, Thailand. Over 1,200 participants have joined this event.

Prof. Unnop Jaisamrarn, Chair of the SRH Committee and Dr. Andy Tan, MIGS Committee Member were invited to take part in the AOFOG session "Advancement in Obs & Gyn Care", which was organized by SRH and MIGS Committee on 31 October 2024.



The Chairpersons for this session were Dr. Rohana Haththotuwa, Secretary General AOFOG and Adjunct Asst. Prof. Aranya Yantapant, MIGS Committee Member AOFOG.

Topics and speakers in this session were as follows:

• Revisiting additional benefits of hormonal contraception: Prof. Unnop Jaisamrarn (Thailand)

• Current roles of robotic surgery in gynecology: Dr. Andy Tan (Singapore)

Topics related to advancement in clinical practice have drawn an attention from more than 300 attendees. The session successfully addressed interesting topics in Obs & Gyn care, followed by a fruitful discussion between the speakers and audience.

Recap of this session:

Revisiting additional benefits of hormonal contraception

- Hormonal methods of contraception have been widely used after the introduction of the first combined oral contraceptive pill (COC) in 1960. These methods include pills, injections, implants, transdermal patches and vaginal rings. Among these, COC is the most commonly used globally.
- Significant adverse effects were reported in users of high-dose pill in the past. However, the modern pill containing 20–30 mcg ethinylestradiol (EE) and low doses of different progestins are much safer and cause less adverse effects.
- A significant proportion of women use COCs for its non-contraceptive health benefits, not for contraception. Since 1980, many review papers have reported these non-contraceptive health benefits of COCs.
- Most commonly reported additional benefits of COCs include less menstrual bleeding disorders and dysmenorrhea, less benign breast disease, less androgen related symptoms, less pelvic inflammatony disease, less stmptoms due to uterine fibroids, higher bone mass, less ovarian cysts and favourble effect of polycystic ovary syndrome. Large cohort studies or case-control studies have provided evidence that the risks of endometrial, ovarian, and colorectal cancers are reduced in women who use oral contraceptives.
- Many clinicians prescribe COCs to treat symptoms due to endometriosis. However, less than half of the papers have reported this benefit. Moreover, a Cochrane review indicates that there is insufficient evidence to make a judgment on the effectiveness of COCs to treat pain associated with endometriosis.
- Most of the evidence showing additional health benefits of COCs were from studies of ethinyl estradiol containing pills. Several reports have shown the efficacy of natural estrogen estradiol containing pill in the treatment of heavy menstrual bleeding. Due to the development of new COCs, health benefits as well as long-term safety have to be investigated.

Current roles of robotic surgery in gynecology.

- Minimal Invasive Surgery (MIS) has been a major breakthrough in the last few decades with its benefits completely changing the surgical practice and training field.
- The advantages are especially profound in Robot-Assisted Surgery (RAS) and include a more

ergonomic and less tiring experience for the surgeon, the elimination of tremor, better dexterity, and a shorter learning curve compared to Conventional Laparoscopic Surgery (CLS).

- RAS also offers a better quality of care for the patient as it is related to a lower incidence of surgical complications, less blood loss, less pain, faster recovery.
- Perioperative complication rates are equivocal between RAS and CLS; however, the evidence is generally of low quality.
- RAS has exhibited superiority over open surgeries and shown to be noninferior compared to CLS.
- Robotic surgeries made significant impact in our practice in areas with difficult access using conventional laparoscopy: esophagectomy and deep pelvic surgery.
- High BMI patients benefit from robotic surgeries.
- With improved ergonomics, fewer acute or long-term work-related musculoskeletal related symptoms.
- Further research looking at the long-term cost effectiveness of robotic surgeries in gynaecology need to consider the complexity of the surgical procedure and women's comorbidities.



2. Regional survey - Violence Against Women (VAW) in Asia and Oceania region

The Violence Against Women Working Group is advancing its multi-country survey on VAW, with a focus on reproductive-aged women and healthcare staff. This survey aims to provide essential insights into the prevalence and impact of VAW, guiding strategies and interventions across the region. Data collection for reproductive-aged women has been completed in Thailand, and current efforts are concentrated on gathering data from healthcare staff. Data collection is also progressing in other countries involved in the study.

3. Community engagement - Violence Against Women public awareness campaign.

AOFOG -VAW research team has been invited to take part in "The Celebration of HRH Prince Mahidol of Songkla, The Prince Father" held at Living Hall, Siam Paragon Shopping Center, Bangkok, Thailand on 21–24 September 2024.

This event aims to raise public awareness of VAW through an exhibition, educating the community on the prevalence, causes, and impact of VAW, as well as available resources for support and

prevention. The exhibition encourages community engagement by sharing stories, statistics, and perspectives on VAW from both local and global angles, empowering attendees to support survivors and foster safe relationships. Interactive sessions allow participants to discuss VAW with specialists and learn about prevention strategies, while educational materials provide tools to identify and address violence. This event also highlights AOFOG's efforts on VAW, including an introduction to the AOFOG Declaration on VAW.

During this event, Prof. Unnop Jaisamrarn, Chair of the SRH Committee participated in a talk on critical issues in Thai Society, addressing the overlooked reality of Violence Against Women. The session drew significant attention from the public audience.







4. Invited manuscript - AOFOG's Declaration on Violence Against Women

This manuscript, commissioned by the Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology Research, outlines AOFOG's Declaration on VAW, providing a framework to address this issue across Asia and Oceania. It highlights the importance of regional cooperation, international guidelines, and the role of national societies and healthcare professionals in strengthening legal frameworks, promoting public education, and offering comprehensive services. The goal is to create a safer and fairer environment for women in the region. We have completed the initial draft and are now inviting coauthors to review and provide feedback on the manuscript.

Gynaecological Oncology Committee Report

Asia Oceania consists of more than 50 countries where there are about 14 high-income and more than 24 low-income countries. Our previous survey study showed that there were vast differences in the practice of cervical cancer preventive measures in our region. The Oncology Committee of 2022–24 collaborated with the Cervical Cancer Elimination Working Group and developed a set of recommendations on HPV vaccination in Asia–Pacific Region, aiming to provide some standards on the HPV vaccine implementation for both low-income and high-income countries. The recommendations were published as a special issue for the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology Research (Tse KY, et al. JOGR 2024 Oct:50 Suppl 1:95–102. doi: 10.1111/jog.16034).

The Mongolian Federation of Obstetrics and Gynaecology (MFOG) and AOFOG had jointly held the Cervical Cancer Elimination Workshop on 26 Sep 24. The theme this year was 'Cervical cancer elimination: RISE to the challenge'. Dr. Ka Yu Tse, Prof. Jean Toral, and Dr.



Rohana Haththotuwa delivered several lectures on cervical cancer prevention on 26 Sep 24. Dr. Baigal Genden, Dr. Erdnijargal Ayush, and other MFOG members also demonstrated the skills of colposcopy and LLETZ, and led a hands-on practical session of LLETZ. In the MFOG Annual Congress 2024 on 27 Sep 24, Dr. Tse and Prof. Toral also gave two plenary lectures on *'Upscaling the Cervical Cancer Elimination program in Asia Oceania - Vaccination'* and *'Upscaling the Cervical Cancer Elimination program in Asia Ocean - Screening'*, respectively.

The Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Hong Kong (OGSHK) also invited AOFOG to hold an AOFOG session. Dr. Ka Yu Tse gave a lecture on 'HPV vaccination' highlighting the unmet needs in some countries in Asia-Pacific Region. After the AOFOG session, Dr.



Tse, Dr. Rohana Haththotuwa and Dr. John Tait presented a souvenir gynaecological oncology textbook to Dr. Jessie Chiu (Hong Kong), who won the 1st runner-up award of the AOFOG Gynecological Oncology Surgical Virtual Workshop – video competition held on 9 Mar 2024. Lastly, Professor Wichai Termrungruanglert, a member of the Oncology Committee, was also invited to present two lectures on *'Self sampling for HPV testing and its application in Thailand'* and *'Triage of HPV positive screening test'*.

On 7 Nov 2024, the Oncology Committee organised a webinar on the updated management of vulvar cancer, a relatively rare yet debilitating cancer (Fig.3). There were seven speakers from different countries, and more than 100 participants with favorable feedback.



OGSM, forms to establish a matrix of experts, trainers, mentors and trainees on safe Implanon insertion and management. This supervised initiative will provide training for primary health care professionals and free contraception for hundreds of women in Malaysia. We hope that this initiative will benefit mothers as we believe in universal access to reversible long-term contraception.

iv. OGSM best practice guides for members

OGSM is currently working on OGSM's Evidence-Based Algorithms, a handbook written by experts in Malaysia on best practices for O&G. This initiative affirms OGSM's dedication to providing cutting-edge knowledge and practices, to help our members deliver the highest quality of care for women.

v. Connecting our members to global experts
